We have grown out of struggle against war and cuts to education in New Jersey. We formed at a banner making party on March 6, 2010. We have mobilized for anti-war demonstrations in Washington DC, New York City, New Brunswick, an Immigrant RIghts May Day march in Hightstown, worked with community members protesting a shooting death by New Brunswick Police, among other movement experience.

Provide a means of communication into all of the high schools and colleges and to youth who are not in school in all of the cities and towns of New Jersey.

Connect youth up to other organizations that are

struggling around these issues.

Mobilize youth to participate in every aspect of planning through participation in actions toward these goals, be they standing on a corner with our banner and passing out fliers, to helping to arrange buses to national marches, to supporting national days of action for education and other important issues as well as social events like concerts, picnics, bashes and other fun ways to unify into a stronger

Make youth a vital part of a mass movement aiming to make changes around these issues of concern.

Why are we against war and imperialism?

Simply put, imperialism is the system powerful nations like the United States use to control other weaker nations. Imperialism pursues the goals of maximized profit for multinational corporations as well as exerting strategic and military muscle into other regions of the world. War and occupation are the most extreme methods of imperialism. Other means could include economic and political manipulation, threats, secret and not so secret involvement in affairs of other countries, sabotage, assassination, support for insurgent groups with weapons, training and intelligence, blockades and sanctions and many other forms of interference. If we want to prevent wars from occurring, we need to challenge the system of imperialism which is constantly laying the groundwork for future wars.

In Latin American countries (like Chile, Guatemala) when students fighting the fees shut down the colleges and the right wing professors try to organize classes at the local high schools, they are ejected by the high school student movement. Free Speech in Our Schools - Not Really! Evade Administration Censorship to Get YO! Out in the Schools

In school, one of the first things that we learn as students is our constitutional rights, one of which is freedom of speech. We learn about how America has fought several wars throughout history for our ideals of freedom and democracy. The intense fear of communism during the Cold War, and the anti-communist propaganda, and the covert operations of the CIA and other government agencies were all supposedly to protect our own rights to free speech. The schools teach us about how the wars in which the United States is involved are being fought for the purpose of bringing democracy to other nations. However, if a student ever tries to exercise this constitutional right, a student may find that the First Amendment is often a myth.

In most high schools, there are regulations on flyer distributions, as well as student groups. Any paper, leaflet, or group often has to be approved by the administration before organizations can be formed and flyers distributed. Even if these media of student expression are approved, they are often strictly regulated, or may be subject to restrictive editing. These same rules do not apply to military recruiters, who do not have to get their methods of recruitment approved, but an antiwar newspaper will probably have to be modified if one takes it to get it approved.

This writer made a public service announcement via the school TV network about an upcoming antiwar March on Washington, and it was a pain to get it approved by the administration. First of all, the speech was delayed a few days, causing some information in the speech to be irrelevant. Also, some of the stronger antiwar language was edited out of the

As far as getting our paper YO! Youth Organizer out, we don't expect the administrations to approve of it, so it is no use asking for approval. However, there are ways to get the paper out that are less obvious. You can distribute them in the

hallways, at the bus stop, or in the commons or lunch room. Also, a good time to hand the paper out is after school hours when there are fewer teachers, staff, and administrators in the building. Also, it may be a good idea to look to teachers to help distribute the papers. We also ask teachers to please look the other way while this paper is getting distributed and remember that we are supporting collective bargaining rights for teachers and other workers, and that we demand support for education. Encourage teachers to use YO! as a curriculum resource for class

Make a list of students who are more likely to be agreeable to our paper and be sure to get it into each of their hands. Identify organizations like LGBT-straight alliances, civil and human rights student groups, amnesty groups, cultural organizations and attend their meetings, introduce the paper and pass them out. Ask teachers if you can do the same, especially in social study classes.

Part of the role of a youth movement is to fight for greater democratic rights and that includes free speech rights in our schools. If you feel that a school is stepping on your attempts to organize, contact us - we want to know about it and if appropriate, we will do what we can to support. The system, including the schools, will not make it easy to organize an effective movement to challenge systemic issues like war, imperialism, austerity and oppression so we will need to be creative and take risks as we work to get our word out and our papers into the hands of the students. At the same time, we can build a vast communication networks within the school corridors - it is virtually impossible for the administrations to get absolute control of the halls. That is what we need to do!
